

Boys & Girls Club of Chaffee County



Boys and Girls Club of Chaffee County inspires and enables all young people, especially those who need us most, to reach their full potential as productive, caring, responsible citizens.

As the gold standard in youth development in Chaffee County, Boys & Girls Club serves over 900 youth each year with over 61 programs and activities:

- The arts
- Career and leadership development
- Education and careers
- Health and life skills
- Sports, recreation and fitness
- Specialized initiatives
- Healthy snacks

Outcomes include increased graduation rates and enhanced academic success.

Revel



Located in Denver, Revel provides teens and adults on the autism spectrum with opportunities that fight potential isolation, depression, unemployment and risk factors related to quality of life

Revel believes that teens and adults on the autism spectrum have the ability to connect, work, learn and explore new interests together. The reality is that 40% have had at least one comorbid diagnosed anxiety disorder and 90% are unemployed or underemployed. 1 in 4 are completely isolated, meaning they have not seen or spoken to a friend in the last year.

Revel fights potential isolation, depression, unemployment and risk factors related to quality of life by providing opportunities to develop meaningful relationships, learn independent living skills, explore interests and career paths, engage in a range of fun activities, and participate in recreational outings and events.

Chaffee County Habitat for Humanity



Habitat for Humanity brings people together to build homes, communities, and hope. An affiliate of Habitat for Humanity International, Chaffee County Habitat for Humanity envisions a world where everyone has a decent place to live.

Its mission is to:

- Build simple, decent homes
- Use volunteer labor and donated materials whenever possible
- Provide affordable mortgages to Habitat homeowners
- Create a greener community through the ReStores
- Transform lives through education and homeownership

Special Kids Special Families



Special Kids, Special Families promotes, strengthens and supports individuals with disabilities, their families and caregivers. Founded in 1998, the organization provides respite and care for children and adults with disabilities. Programs offer community support services to families that are designed to meet the needs of individuals with disabilities throughout their life span.

Its services include:

- Zach's Place at the Laurie Hillyard Family Center, providing respite to families and daycare to children with disabilities & special needs
- Foster care and adoption, providing loving homes for children in foster care
- Joey's Place Adult Center: A center-based activity program for adults with disabilities & special needs
- Community day care program that engages adults in recreational, social, and educational activities
- Residential host homes that care for and nurture adults with disabilities
- Support and empowerment services

Coletrain Music Academy



Coletrain Music Academy is driven by the transformative power of music and art to ignite change, foster connection, and uplift communities.

The academy believes that music transcends boundaries, serving as both medicine for the soul and a universal language that unites us all. Regardless of age, background, or where you call home, Coletrain Music Academy is committed to making the gift of music accessible to everyone. Lemonade Day



Designed for kids ages 6 to 12, Lemonade Day is a fun, experiential program that teaches youth how to start, own and operate their very own business - a lemonade stand. Each year, in participating cities, youth have the opportunity to experience entrepreneurship.

The program helps prepare youth for life through fun, proactive and experiential programs infused with life skills, character education, and entrepreneurship. The foremost objective is to help today's youth become the business leaders, social advocates, community volunteers and forward-thinking citizens of tomorrow. We want to build self-esteem and new mindsets that can propel youth to success they likely would not have pursued otherwise. Our youth need a mindset that equips them to recognize opportunity, take initiative and innovate in the face of challenges – in essence, to dream and achieve.

Chaffee County Early Childhood Council



Founded in 2007, CCECC facilitates broad collaboration across the communities of Chaffee County to identify and address local needs related to early childhood. CCECC's efforts have resulted in the implementation of sustainable, cost-effective solutions that bring evidence-based services to families in our small communities.

Its mission is to build a comprehensive, sustainable system of local services that ensures all Chaffee County children have the supports they need to start school ready to learn. CCECC is one of 34 Early Childhood Councils in Colorado that work in partnership to ensure the youngest children are ready for school and families have the support they need to work and succeed.

Ronald McDonald House of Southern Colorado



Ronald McDonald House provides essential services that remove barriers, strengthen families, and promote healing when children need healthcare.

Located in Children's Hospital in Colorado Springs, Ronald McDonald House is a 25,000 square foot facility that provides a warm, safe, clean and friendly environment for up to twenty families per night. It has two kitchens, family-friendly dining and living rooms, laundry facilities, and indoor and outdoor play areas for children. The House is a home-away-from-home for families in need.

Additionally, the Ronald McDonald Living Room is housed inside Children's Hospital, Colorado, and provides a breathing space and easy access to amenities for families with seriously ill, hospitalized children.

Realities for Children



Realities For Children provides for the unmet needs of Northern Colorado children who have been abused, neglected or are at-risk. We do this by providing Emergency Funding, Youth Activities, critical Item Distributions, and collaboration resources for our Partner Agencies.

The organization's vision is to build a resource like none other the world has ever seen, one that empowers the child protection community through collaboration, fiscal efficiency, and a strong continuum of service so that every child in need is provided for in our community. Turner Farm & Apple Orchard: Now a venue for special events, this 1900s homestead is home to the summer Farm Concert Series and the annual Apple Fest—a living history day filled with fun activities and traditional delights.

Depot & Transportation Museum stands as a testament to Buena Vista's rich railroad history and invites visitors to embark on a captivating journey through Buena Vista's transportation past.
