

BOYS & GIRLS CLUB OF CHAFFEE COUNTY



Boys and Girls Club of Chaffee County inspires and enables all young people, especially those who need us most, to reach their full potential as productive, caring, responsible citizens.

As the gold standard in youth development in Chaffee County, Boys & Girls Club serves over 900 youth each year with over 61 programs and activities:

- The arts
- Career and leadership development
- Education and careers
- Health and life skills
- Sports, recreation and fitness
- Specialized initiatives
- Healthy snacks

Outcomes include increased graduation rates and enhanced academic success.

HOUSE OF LIGHT



Based in Aurora, Colorado, House of Light partners with local shelters to provide the items that turn a house into a home.

House of Light gathers and furnishes homes with new or gently used donations. They do this by partnering with local shelters such as The Family Tree, Family Promise and Aurora Housing Authority, who provide the organization with 10 to 15 families each month. Often these families are single mothers with more than 2 children.

Since their founding in 2017, they have served 1,398 people including over 880 kids. Over 884 beds have been distributed.

CULINARY HOSPITALITY OUTREACH WELLNESS



CHOW supports wellness within the hospitality industry and improves the lives of our community through shared stories, skills, and resources.

Over 63% of food, beverage and hospitality professionals suffer from depression, an even greater percentage report substance abuse issues. CHOW cares for the people who take such good care of us, providing a place for restaurant staff to feel supported, heard and appreciated. They facilitate gatherings where participants can build meaningful connections with folks who “get it,” and they lift each other up so we don’t lose anyone else to suicide, addiction or struggles surrounding mental health.

In 2022, CHOW connected with over 12,325 people and offered over 240 hours of free mental health training.

DARREN PATTERSON CHRISTIAN ACADEMY



Based on the fundamental belief that children learn best through doing, students are supported to do far more than they think they can in order to grow in both intelligence and character.

At Darren Patterson Christian Academy, teachers instruct in ways that enable students to experience deeper learning, surpass standards, and produce high-quality work. Students are guided in their studies to discover an authentic love of learning.

Here’s how they do it:

- Limited enrollment and small class sizes
- Teaching to each child rather than to their grade
- Uphold community as central to curriculum
- Use adventure to deepen learning
- Guiding school leaders, teachers, students, and families to work together to model academic courage and create a culture of respect, responsibility, and joy in learning

The Rose Andom Center is a place for domestic violence victims to find the safety, support, and services needed to rebuild their lives and heal their families.

Based in Denver, the Rose Andom Center was the result of over ten years of collaboration between community based organizations and city government agencies who were committed to making it easier for victims to ask for and find help.

Their core principles include:

- The needs of all survivors are met.
- Survivors are supported and heard.
- Children are protected and offered an environment for healing.
- Survivors are empowered to achieve self-sufficiency.
- Families thrive.
- Foster a culture of collaboration, support, and accountability.
- Hope is realized.
- Offenders are held accountable.
- The cycle of violence ends.
